More congratulations. On May 3rd, a Non-Commissioned Officer Induction





they say there is no such thing as an ex-Marine, only retired Marines. There is truly a "no man left behind" attitude projected by every member.


Respect makes a group stand out and the absence of respect, by even one person, makes a void that is very difficult to fill.

Let's all make this year's Operation Gratitude event even more extraordinary than last year's event. We can all serve the veterans just as they had served our country.



June celebration of Caribbean American heritage



June commemorates the second annual celebration of Caribbean American heritage. According to the most recent census, there are more than three million Americans of Caribbean heritage. The Caribbean culture is diverse with influences from Barbados, the Bahamas, Cuba, Trinidad and Tobago, Jamaica, Haiti and other islands within the Caribbean Sea region. In an effort to honor the contributions to American culture, Congresswoman Barbara Lee (Democrat-Oakland, Calif.) introduced H. Con. Res. 148 Bill saying "Establishing a Caribbean American Heritage month will help pay tribute to the tremendous contributions Caribbean Americans have made throughout the history of this country. They have influenced every aspect of American culture, society and government." The bill was subsequently approved by the U.S. House of Representatives June 27, 2005 and U.S. Senate Feb. 14, 2006.

Caribbean Americans have been leaders in government, entertainment, sports and social movements within American society. Gen. Colin Powell (Ret.), of Jamaican descent, served as

the first black American U.S. Secretary of State and is recognized as one of the most influential American politicians in the international community. Actor Harry Belafonte, who is Jamaican, popularized Caribbean music style with his signature "Banana Boat Song." Sidney Poitier, who is Bahamian, became the first black man to win the Academy Award for Best Actor for his role in *Lilies of the Field*. Mr. Belafonte and Mr. Poitier also served as advocates for civil rights and humanitarian causes throughout their careers.

The lists of contributions to America by Caribbean Americans are well beyond the scope of this brief article. In recognizing the accomplishments of a few great Americans, we may also honor and celebrate their unique Caribbean heritage during Caribbean American Heritage Month. Airmen can request Afghan, Iraq medal

A recent memorandum from the Office of the Under Secretary of Defense provides guidance on the wear of campaign stars on both the Afghanistan and Iraq campaign medals.

The campaign stars recognize servicemembers for participating in designated campaign phases within the areas of responsibility for both awards.

In order to qualify for the campaign stars, Airmen must first qualify for the campaign medals by having served in the area of eligibility for 30 consecutive or 60 nonconsecutive days, and must provide official source documentation to confirm their participation in the AOE. Approved decorations, performance reports or travel vouchers can be used as official documentation.

Airmen become eligible to wear the campaign stars by serving one or more days in the following campaigns:

For Afghanistan:

Liberation of Afghanistan - Sept. 11 to Nov. 30, 2001
Consolidation I - Dec. 1, 2001 to Sept. 30, 2006
Consolidation II - Oct. 1, 2006, until a date to be determined.

For Iraq:

Liberation of Iraq - March 19 to May 1, 2003
Transition of Iraq - May 2, 2003 to June 28, 2004
Iraqi Governance - June 29, 2004 to Dec. 15, 2005
National Resolution - Dec. 16, 2005, until a date to be determined.

If an individual's initial inclusive period of deployment overlaps one or more of the approved campaign phases, the Airman will be entitled to the appropriate number of campaign stars.

"If you've already had 30 days in the qualifying area — 10 of those days during Liberation Phase and 20 during Consolidation Phase I — you'll qualify for the campaign medal and two campaign stars," said Col. William Foote, director of personnel services at the Air Force Personnel Center.

Active duty members, Guard, Reserve and veterans who qualify to wear the campaign stars with the medals can contact their military personnel element or flight.

Defense Department to protect personal information with new ID card

As a means of combating identity theft, the Defense Department will issue identification cards without full Social Security numbers printed onto them, a senior official said recently.

The Defense Department cares about protecting personal information as well as increasing database security. Plans are to remove the Social Security numbers from identification cards issued to military family members by the end of this year. Between 2009 and 2010, all department-issued identification cards will feature only the last four digits of a holder's Social Security number.

About 3.4 million people now have department-issued common access cards. About two-thirds of those card holders are military members, and some civilians who deploy overseas, who have full Social Security numbers printed onto the back of their CACs.

Modern information technology precludes the need to have full social security numbers printed onto employee and family member ID cards. New identification cards will be issued as they reach their expiration dates. (AFPN)

Air Force has new web site for retirees

The Air Force has a new web site just for its retiree community that is full of news and information, plus it is easy to access and navigate.

The Air Force Retiree Services site is located at www.retirees.af.mil.

This public Web site offers the retiree family in-depth information on the Survivor Benefit Plan, plus a list of Air Force Retiree Activities Offices worldwide and various other resources. There are also sections dedicated to the *Afterburner* and Air Force Retiree News Service.

Visitors can access the sections by using the top navigation bar on the home page. The home page also features the latest Air Force headline news and video clips. There is even a special icon for quick access to the Combat-Related Special Compensation information page.

Subscribing to the electronic version of the *Afterburner* and AFRNS is now much easier: just click on the word "Subscribe" found on the top navigation bar; find "Afterburner/AFRNS" near the top of the second column and click in the circle to subscribe; enter the required e-mail address; and then click on the submit button.
